Purpose of consultancy:	Background Liberia has a population of 5.3 million people and an annual growth rate of 3%. Youth (0-34 yrs) constitutes 75%, while adolescents (10-19 yrs) account for 24.2% of the population. There is rapid urbanization (54.5% of the population lives in urban areas) fueled by internal migration, which puts strain on existing public services that have not expanded at the same pace as the growing urban population.	
	Liberia's TFR is 4.2 with high childhood and maternal mortality (742 deaths per 100,000 live births). Youth unemployment is very high due to limited opportunities in the public and private sectors and the lack of market-relevant skills.	
	Access to basic social services such as health care and education is either limited or characterized by high inequality. Although 70.3% of inhabitants have access to healthcare within one hour, there is high inequality between rural (49%) and urban (88%) households. Disparities in access to quality education, particularly between boys and girls, hinder progress towards the SDGs. While the primary school completion rate is 10 % for boys and 11% for girls, 41% of females and 30% of males aged six and older have no formal education, while 42% of girls and 46% of complete lower secondary education.	
	Under the ARREST Agenda, the Government of Liberia has requested UNFPA's support in developing a National Population Policy as it seeks to create a modern, innovative, and productive economy, where Liberians are fully equipped with the skills to compete in a dynamic, global market. Measures should be in place to contain the increase in the population growth rates. The new population policy to set new targets as the 2005 Revised Edition of the National Population Policy ended in 2020. The development of programs to take advantage of the reduction in the dependency ratio by creating more job opportunities and embarking on career training for the working-age population.	
	The Government plans to develop a new, high-skilled, knowledge-based, globally oriented economy through a social covenant of universal access to free tertiary education and training, quality universal healthcare, access to affordable land and housing, the protection of public spaces and the environment, respect for diversity, fundamental freedoms, rights and responsibilities and equality under the law. The ability of the country to achieve these social and economic goals is partly dependent on the size, growth, distribution, and structure of its population.	
	These variables are examined through population processes of fertility (births), mortality (deaths), and migration (immigration and emigration). According to the 2022 Liberia Housing and Population Census report of 2024, over 62 years, the population of Liberia has increased by 4,233,744 persons, from 1,016,443 persons in 1962 to 5,250,187 persons in 2022.	
	The 2022 Liberia Housing and Population Census showed a broad-based pyramid that indicated a high number of young individuals. It suggests a high birth rate and a large proportion of children and adolescents in the population. It implies a large dependent population (children and adolescents), which places a burden on the working-age	

population. This may imply that a significant portion of resources should be allocated to childcare, education, and health services for the younger population.

The age dependency ratio has reduced from 90.0 in 1984, 82.9 in 2008, to 58.8 in 2022. This low dependency ratio of 58.8 indicates a sufficient number of people in the working age group that can support the dependent population.

It outlines a set of population goals and targeted interventions and strategies to reduce population-related impediments to achieving the Government's medium and long-term economic and social objectives, including recommendations that relate to legislation.

The Population Situation Analysis (PSA) or another analysis based on the PSA guide will provide the evidence base for the formulation of the Population Policy. The PSA is a collaborative effort between the UNFPA and national entities and a critical tool for understanding and identifying population dynamics, providing data and evidence to support public policymaking.

As part of its continued support of this critical process, the Government of Liberia, through the Population Policy Coordination Unit, has requested UNFPA's support through a consultancy to prepare and finalize a National Population Policy.

Purpose of the consultancy

The primary objective of this consultancy is to support the Government of Liberia in developing a comprehensive, evidence-based, and multi-sectoral National Population Policy that aligns with national development goals and international commitments.

Specific objectives include:

- Conducting a thorough analysis of the current population situation, trends, and their implications for sustainable development in Liberia.
- Reviewing existing policies, strategies, and legal frameworks relevant to population issues.
- Facilitating broad stakeholder consultations to gather diverse perspectives and ensure ownership of the policy.
- Drafting a comprehensive National Population Policy document with a clear vision, goals, objectives, strategies, and implementation mechanisms.
- Developing a framework for monitoring and evaluating the implementation of the National Population Policy.
- Providing recommendations for strengthening institutional capacity for population policy implementation and coordination.

Scope of work:

Consultancy To conduct MISP Readiness Assessment in Liberia

The Consultant will undertake the following tasks:

Inception Phase:

- Conduct an inception meeting with the key stakeholders to clarify the scope of work, methodology, and timelines.
- Develop a detailed work plan and timeline for the consultancy, including specific deliverables and milestones.
- Conduct a desk review of relevant national policies, strategies, legislation, demographic data, research reports, and international frameworks.
- Situation Analysis:
- Undertake a comprehensive analysis of Liberia's current population dynamics, including trends in fertility, mortality, migration, urbanization, and age structure.
- Assess the socio-economic, environmental, and health implications of these population trends.
- Identify key population challenges and opportunities, including regional disparities and vulnerable populations.
- Analyze the existing institutional framework and capacities for addressing population issues.

Stakeholder Consultations:

- Evidence-based strategies and interventions to address identified population challenges and leverage opportunities. These strategies should be practical, feasible, and culturally sensitive.
- Consideration of cross-cutting issues such as gender equality, youth empowerment, environmental sustainability, and poverty reduction.
- Attention to specific population groups, including adolescents, women, men, older persons, and persons with disabilities.
- Strategies for addressing regional disparities and the needs of vulnerable populations.

Implementation Framework:

Develop a clear framework for the implementation of the National Population Policy, including:

- Roles and responsibilities of key government ministries, agencies, and other stakeholders.
- Mechanisms for coordination and collaboration across sectors.
- Potential partnerships with civil society organizations, the private sector, and international development partners.
